Here are the types:CaningFibrer CordRushAsh SplintShaker TapeHer instructions are such that if you can smoke a loin of pork properly, you have the patience to successfully weave. My point is you can do these first time out.She includes an entry on attitude for each. She tells you that caning came from Portugal, with the fortified wine, to the Queen of England in the 1600's, so get off your rocketship and take it slow and easy. She includes check points and error correction. The rush of course came with Moses out of Egypt. She lets you know the method has not changed. And that you will do a good job first time out, but nicely improve over the course of several.She covers stuffing, drying and finishing. The illustrations are expertly rendered for following along, even twisting.
