I created a dice baseball game called LF Baseball and I am constantly playing out seasons using players from the past. It's great to be able to have photos of players you never heard of. What did Bob Caruthers look like? Maybe I just used him as a starting pitcher, and all he was to me was an LF Baseball card, a bunch of stats, a bunch of ratings, and either the winner or the loser of my last game. But it adds something if you can see a photo of him. There is a very large set of cards produced in about 1888 or so, obviously covering a few years. It's hard to read the names on the cards. I have been writing the names under the cards in this book. Some of them are illegible, the photo too light to make out a name, but I can make out most of them. The cards only have the player's last name most of the time, along with his position and team. I have been using my Baseball Encyclopedia to see who it is, and I write the first and last name, which can be determined 90% of the time. There are a few players with baseball cards from 1888 or so who don't appear in the Baseball Encyclopedia because they never played in the Major Leagues.
