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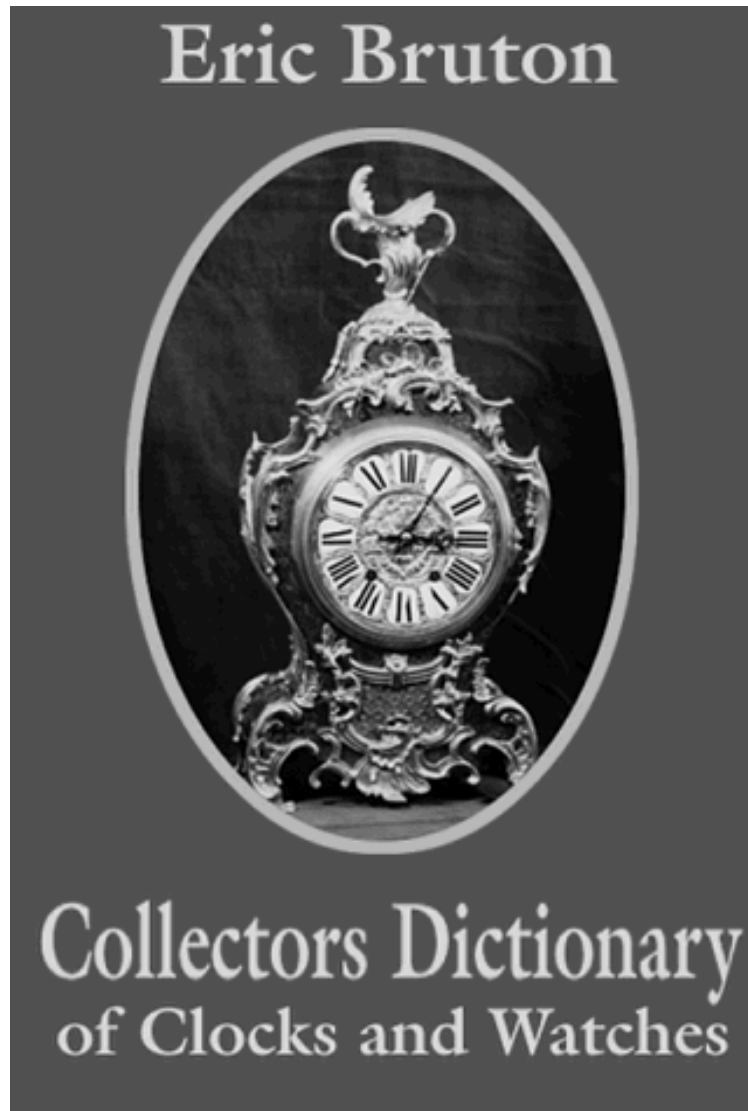

It explains the technical and specialist terms of the various parts and their functions in everyday language, and deals with most of the vast number of types and styles of clocks and watches produced over the years, with special attention to collectable ones. It lists the individuals who made important contributions to mechanical horology over its 600-year history, such as those exceptional men who invented and produced remarkable time-keepers. There are stories of the surprising survivals of Captain Cook's time-keeper, the chronometer that belonged to Captain Bligh of the *Bounty*, and Captain Scott's watch from the Antarctic. This comprehensive guide, painstakingly compiled over many years from the author's vast knowledge is a must for all those interested in horology.
