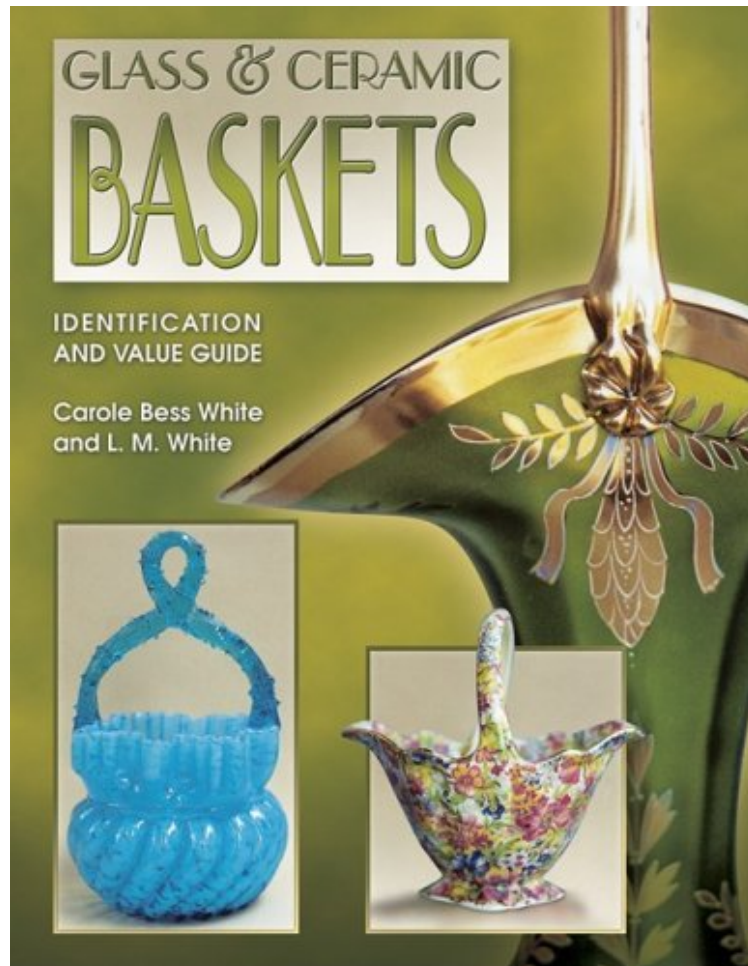

Foster I think this book has a lot of good material, so far as providing a visual guide to the array of baskets a collector might look at. I was missing the descriptions and history that you get in more text-rich guidebooks, though. One of the reasons we collect is for the story that each piece tells, and you need that background information to appreciate what a piece you've just acquired represents. Pictures count for a lot, though, because you often see a piece for sale that isn't identified, and you want to develop a good internal reference for recognizing the work of various manufacturers. Almost 600 photographs of both old (pre-1950s) and new (1960s-present) baskets are featured, as well as a good selection of old magazine ads and import catalogs. Cambridge, Heisey, Fenton, Duncan, Imperial, Westmoreland, plus a selection of the more modern imported glass baskets that sell so briskly now are represented. Roseville is the largest of the potteries represented in the book, and there are too many others to list. Each basket is pictured and accompanied by a brief description, market value, and country of manufacture. AUTHOR BIO: Carole White is the author of a four-volume series on Made in Japan Ceramics.
