QuanThe weirdest thing about this book is that it looks like it was miscut at the printers: there's a three-inch all-white, unprinted border at the top throughout the entire book, including covers. This is a fairly small in size/thickness softcover book that should have been priced at no more than \$24.95 retail. And it's not like the pages are cram-packed with photos and info. You'll breeze through this book pretty fast, unlike their other volumes.That said,the content in the book is great and well worth checking out if you can get this at a discount. Some of the cast and crew items you'll have seen before from other Star Wars collecting books, but there are many items included here that I had no idea existed. Most all of the photos are in color with good descriptions of when and where they came from. It's a

nice addition to their other two books that gives you insight into a rarely explored niche in the Star Wars collecting universe. Sadly, I'm used to being price gouged for Star Wars memorabilia but I still can't get over the \$40 price tag on this one. I'll give Gus and Duncan the benefit of the doubt that they didn't decide on the book's retail price and hope that it came from the publisher. My copy of Gus and Duncan's Comprehensive Guide to Star Wars Collectibles is almost always bookmarked to the Cast Crew section which only has thumbnail size photos. This book's wonderful layout and design expands those photos full size and gives brief descriptions of each item. Cast Crew memorabilia is a niche market in the Star Wars collecting community. You won't find any toys and action figures in this book but that shouldn't keep the casual Star Wars collector from appreciating the items from a uniqueness and rarity standpoint. In fact, I've been a long time Star Wars collector and there's quite a few pieces that I didn't even know existed. Included in this book are crew t-shirts, holiday cards, screening invitations, stationery, and much, much more. Recommended for anyone who considers themselves a Star Wars Collector!

Some of the most obscure and scarce Star Wars collectibles ever produced are the items offered to the crew and cast of the Star Wars films. Duncan Jenkins and Gus Lopez take the reader on a tour of crew memorabilia from all of the Star Wars films and productions, from Star Wars: A New Hope to Revenge of the Sith, along with crew memorabilia from Blue Harvest, the Droids and Ewoks cartoons, the Ewok movies, Star Tours, Lucasfilm, Skywalker Ranch, Industrial Light and Magic, and Clone Wars. These extremely limited T-shirts, jackets, coasters, patches, caps, stationery, greeting cards, and invitations are covered in depth. Each chapter is organized by film/production in a snazzy design by Mattias Rendahl offering extensive photographs and information.

About the Author Duncan Jenkins started collecting Star Wars in the summer of 1977. As one of the last remaining completists, he has amassed one of the largest private collections of Star Wars memorabilia in the world. Duncan has shared his extensive knowledge of collecting in presentations at all six US Celebrations, Celebration Europe, Celebration Japan, and at various conventions throughout the world. Duncan is co-author of Gus and Duncan's Comprehensive Guide to Star Wars Collectibles and Gus and Duncan's guide to Star Wars Prototypes. He is an editor for The Star Wars Collectors Archive ([theswca.com](http://theswca.com)) and contributor to numerous articles on StarWars.com, in Magazines, books, and TV/ Radio programs.
